The Swan Diaries.

Tales from the Lakeside. (but not really!)

We still have a noticeable lack of swans at the lake, actually things there are rather quiet in general. There's Cookie always shouting for pellets, and Tommy the Canada goose flying over to me honking like crazy before almost diving head-first into the feed bucket. Last weekend there were well over 100 geese at the lake, including Candy the greylag goose that was adopted and raised by the big Canadian family, which really caught me out as I had only taken enough grain for a normal visit, but they were mostly just passing through and when I went over this morning there were only about fifteen geese. They were still very pleased to see me though, especially as they'd had a frightening night due to the stormy weather.

To update you on Little Hen, the moorhen chick who was stuck on the tree branch last month, he quickly learnt to fly properly after his adventure and has now left the nest to fend for himself; although he's still close enough to his parents to be helped if need be and I can see they keep a close eye on him and their other chick. Unlike most of the water birds, the moorhens have had a very good year for breeding with some families hatching as many as six chicks at once.



Another recent success is Indi (short for Individual) who is also a Canada goose. There's no way to know the cause, maybe a stroke or an injury of some sort, but Indi has a sunken right eye and was unable to lift his right wing at all which of course meant he couldn't fly and was at risk from predators. For a couple of months I went out of my way to make sure Indi got his share of the food to get him as strong as possible, and I had a rescue place agreed for him in case he was unable to remain in the wild. Gradually I noticed Indi was starting to use the wing more and more, and the last day I saw him, he flew across the lake with two other geese before landing in front of me – and then he was gone, along with the majority of the Canadians. It's difficult as I get so attached to the birds that need a bit of extra care, but they're wild and free and if Indi now feels

strong enough to go off travelling with his own kind, then it is the best thing for him. ♥ By Allie Short.

Dorset Apple Traybake

450g cooking apples
Juice of half a lemon
225g butter, softened
280g sugar
4 eggs
2 tsp vanilla extract
350g self raising flour
2 tsp baking powder
Demerara sugar, to sprinkle

Heat oven to 180c/fan 160c/gas mark 4 Butter and line a rectangular baking tin. Peel, core and thinly slice the apples then squeeze the lemon juice over. Set to one side.

Place the butter, sugar,eggs, vanilla, flour and baking powder into a large bowl and mix well until smooth. Spread half the mixture into the tin. Arrange half the apples over the top of the mixture, then repeat the layers. Sprinkle over the demerara sugar. Bake for 45-50 minutes until golden and springy to the touch. Leave to cool then turn out of the tin and remove paper. Cut into squares and enjoy. Serve warm with custard or cream or eat cold.
